“Inclusive and happy” Leyland Methodist Infant School praised by Ofsted

Leyland Methodist Infant School has been widely praised by Ofsted following its first inspection in over a decade – and has been graded as Good in every judgement area.

Inspectors commended the school’s inclusive ethos, high expectations and the strong start to education it provides for its youngest learners, all under the more rigorous set of guidelines that have been introduced since the school’s last inspection in 2013.

Ofsted inspectors also praised the school’s warm and nurturing environment, highlighting the positive relationships between staff, pupils and families. The report noted: “Leaders and staff have created strong, supportive relationships with pupils and their families. Pupils feel they are well cared for and are keen to do their best.”

Karen Chadwick, Executive Headteacher, said: “We are really pleased that the report celebrates what makes our school the school that it is – our happy, caring and inclusive ethos.



“While Ofsted judgements are important, knowing that our supportive environment helps children feel ready to learn and able to thrive is hugely rewarding. Our children shone throughout the inspection, and we take huge satisfaction in the fact that all parents who completed the survey said that their child felt safe at our school – and nearly 100% said they would recommend it to others.

“That is a real testament to the commitment and expertise of our staff – we are a real team here at Leyland Infants.”



Westleigh Methodist Primary has “high aspirations for all pupils”

Westleigh Methodist Primary School was also celebrating a successful Ofsted inspection this term, with inspectors concluding that the school remains ‘Good’ after a two-day visit.

Inspectors praised the school’s high aspirations for all pupils, noting that the ‘curriculum is ambitious for all, including for disadvantaged pupils and those with SEND’.

They highlighted how pupils take on extra responsibilities ‘such as playground leaders and school councillors’ and are proud to contribute to their school.

Inspectors also praised the school’s ‘welcoming and friendly’ atmosphere, observing that ‘pupils are well-mannered and are supportive and encouraging to their friends’ and that they ‘enjoy learning’. The report also commended the strong values of respect, love, generosity, and equality that underpin the school’s ethos.

Louise Boardman, Headteacher, said: “We are particularly proud of the work that has been put in by our staff and the wider community. However, this doesn’t compare to the changes our pupils have made – without them trying their best every single day, we couldn’t have achieved this.

“We have worked hard to change the culture at this school and to ensure our children treat not only each other but everyone with kindness. This is the foundation upon which every successful learning environment thrives.”

Two children from **Rosehill** summed it up: "It was the best day of my life – ever!" and "If singing is your thing, it's fantastic – I would go again if I had the chance."

Thank you to the very talented Jane Smith, who led the day amazingly and for teaching all the songs to the children. Thank you also to all the pupils and staff whose hard work made the 'Big Sing!' such an inspiring event. We are proud of the way our children represented their schools and the Trust, and we look forward to many more opportunities for them to flourish and succeed together.

Marvel at the masters



Across our Epworth Trust family, pupils have been inspired to marvel at the brilliance of artistic and historical masters.

At **Bedford Hall Methodist Primary School**, Year 4 children explored LS Lowry's iconic work at The Lowry Museum and created their own interpretations in a hands-on art workshop.

Leyland Methodist Schools celebrated artistic expression through music and storytelling, with pupils



enjoying a live Philharmonic Orchestra performance, working with a resident artist, and meeting a local author.

Meanwhile, **Bakewell Methodist Academy** pupils sang alongside the Halle Orchestra in Derby, delighting in a thrilling repertoire of space-themed music - from Jupiter to Star Wars!

At **Westleigh Methodist Primary School**, a spectacular science show amazed and engaged young learners, proving that science can be just as creative and awe-inspiring as the arts.



Walk a while in someone's shoes



At **Leyland Methodist Schools**, pupils have been encouraged to develop empathy and understanding by walking a while in others' shoes. Year 6 pupils visited the Imperial War Museum and had the privilege of meeting war veterans, giving them an insight into the sacrifices made by others.

Chancellor of the Exchequer visits Westleigh

Westleigh Methodist Primary School had a very exciting visit this term from Chancellor of the Exchequer, Rachel Reeves, and other local MPs including Lisa Nandy, MP for Wigan and Secretary of State for Culture, Media and Sport.

The very special guests were at the school to find out more about the work that goes on at Westleigh and launch the Better Futures Fund, a new package of funding worth £500m to help charities and civil society organisations to invest in youth services and do more to tackle child poverty.

The funding will support organisations like AllChild, a charity the school works closely with and that provides invaluable support to some pupils.

Louise Boardman, Headteacher, said: "While it is not our job to be political, it was a fantastic opportunity to show off all the things that make our school so special. We told them how proud our community is, but times are tough and we support anything that helps communities like ours.

"Our children shone throughout the visit! They took it all in their stride – they even read books and made Lego with the Chancellor.

"It was a very memorable day and we even made the evening news!"



Generosity in action

At Epworth Education Trust, generosity is at the heart of all we do. Pupils and staff across our schools have been busy fundraising to support great causes. Here's a small snapshot of some of the amazing fundraising activities...

At **Summerseat Methodist Primary School**, the weekly 'Agent of Change' focus inspires pupils to contribute to their communities. Many pupils have worked hard through charity events and sponsored walks, but Rory's efforts stand out. He raised **£250** by completing personal gym challenges to support a family friend who urgently needed a wheelchair.

Over at **Wheatley Lane Methodist Primary School** the brilliant Rotakids group have been hard at work this year, raising money for a range of good causes. Their infant and junior disco was a huge hit, bringing in an impressive **£850** – enough to help train three guide dogs: Norman, Henry and Clover. The fundraising didn't stop there – by selling mince pies, tea and coffee at the school's 'singathon', they raised **£520** for Edukids, with a further **£300** collected during their annual choir concert. A fantastic effort from everyone involved!



At **Wesley Methodist Primary School**, fundraising has been a real team effort this year. Their incredible PTA has raised **£5,090** over the academic year - and that's before the summer fair! This success is thanks to the dedication of every PTA member and the regular events they run throughout the year.

The school also raised over **£1,500** through their 'Wesley Warriors' event – a brilliant combination of obstacle course and colour run. Held on a Saturday morning, the event saw fantastic support from children and families across the school community.

Of the total raised, **£720** will go to Edukid to support two children in Uganda with their education, while the remaining funds will be used to benefit pupils at Wesley, with plans to invest in new outdoor provision areas.



Westleigh Methodist Primary School, used fundraising as a powerful way to teach pupils about community and making a difference. This year, the school raised funds for a wide range of causes, including **£179** for #HelloYellow Day, **£110.33** for Children in Need, **£85.88** for Comic Relief, **£684** for new PE equipment through a sponsored athlete event, **£80** for the Royal British Legion, and **£450** for Edukid. The school also earned **£308.97** in book rewards through their book fair.



In addition to fundraising, pupils and families at Westleigh supported 'The Brick', a local Wigan charity, with generous donations of food, toiletries and essentials. These acts of kindness helped families facing crisis and brought the school community together.



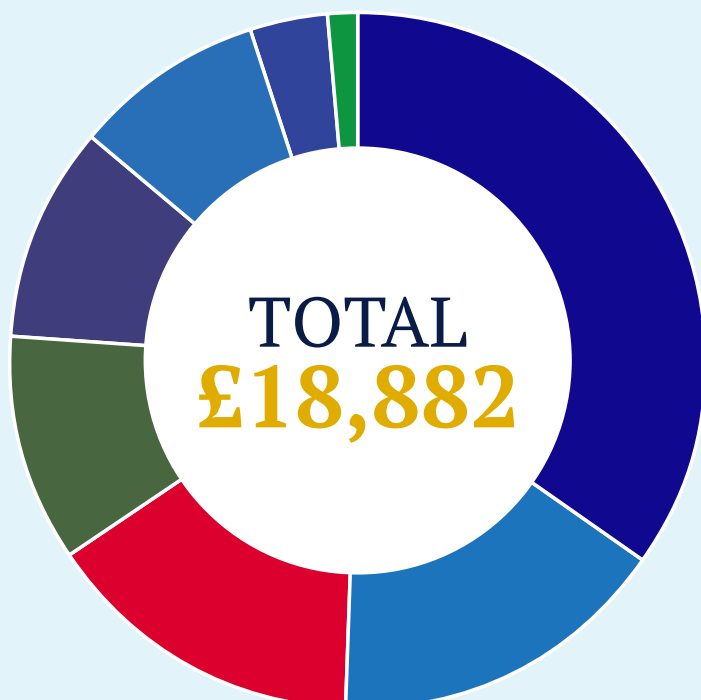
Over at **Rosehill Methodist Primary Academy**, the school community has raised an impressive amount through a variety of events. Highlights include **£650** from last year's summer fair, **£600.32** from the Christmas fair, and **£578.16** from a fun-filled school disco. Additional funds came from a Mother's Afternoon Tea (**£206.64**), Father's Day Picnic (**£216**), and a generous **£454.26** from the Asda cash pot. A **£100** donation from Hollingworth Methodist Church also added to the total. A fantastic team effort from staff, pupils and families alike!



In addition to the other sterling efforts from every school in the Trust, all this amazing fundraising means that in total we have raised an incredible **£18,882.06!**

We're excited to build on this spirit of giving with the launch of 'The Big Serve' – coming next year. This trust-wide competition will celebrate random acts of kindness, with schools coming together to see just how many times we can serve others and how many acts of kindness we can achieve collectively.

We couldn't be prouder of the difference our pupils are making – **one act of generosity at a time.**



Spotlight on Outdoor Learning

Across our schools, pupils are regularly stepping outside to explore, discover and grow through outdoor learning and Forest School activities. Whether it's building dens, spotting wildlife or simply enjoying time in nature, these experiences play a vital role in our children's education.

Here's a look at how some of our schools are embracing the great outdoors...



At **Bedford Hall Methodist Primary School**, Year 1 pupils enjoyed a trip to Gorse Covert Mounds in Warrington for a magical 'fairy forest' experience. They spent the day exploring, building dens, cooking on a campfire and making special memories. Meanwhile, Nursery pupils have been getting stuck into weekly Forest School sessions, building confidence and curiosity through outdoor play.



Over at **Nutgrove Methodist Primary School**, pupils took part in a five-week Forest School after-school club, led by Teaching Assistant Karen Murphy. They explored the forest area, went on bug hunts, planted flowers, made bird feeders and decorated stones with thoughtful messages. The children loved being outside and connecting with nature.

Recently, the Year 4 pupils at **Leyland Methodist Schools** enjoyed a day of adventure and challenge at the Anderton Centre, while the youngest learners in EYFS had an exciting trip to the zoo, bringing their learning about animals to life in a hands-on, memorable way.



At **Bakewell Methodist Academy**, pupils enjoy half-termly Forest School sessions where they build skills like shelter building, knot tying and fire lighting. Each day includes reflection time to foster respect for nature and self-confidence. Next year, Bakewell

will expand outdoor learning through a partnership with the Harmony Project.

Finally, **Westleigh Methodist Primary School**, Year 1 pupils visited 'The Hive' in Bolton - a fantastic outdoor space filled with gardens and natural play equipment. The children took part in a minibeast hunt, shelter building, and created environmental art using natural materials. The visit was especially valuable for Westleigh, where outdoor space is limited, and gave pupils an inspiring opportunity to connect with nature.

The school also gave Year 5 pupils an unforgettable outdoor adventure with a residential at 'Brathay' in the Lake District. Surrounded by the beauty of Lake Windermere, children took part in canoeing, raft-building, orienteering and woodland walks - all designed to make memories in nature!

Thank you to all our staff and pupils for embracing outdoor learning with such enthusiasm. Across the Trust, we believe time spent in nature is helping our children grow in confidence and curiosity for the world around them - and we can't wait to see where their adventures take them next.



This is Epworth - Worship together

Epworth Worship Together is a way for our Methodist family of schools to come together in shared worship - celebrating faith, exploring values, and growing in community, all through child-led, vibrant and meaningful collective worship.

This is achieved through a shared weekly programme of themed worship, with schools taking turns to lead using videos, songs and reflections. Each school also creates a resource pack to help others follow along with the worship, including prompts, prayers, activities and a QR code linking directly to the worship video created by the children. It helps children see themselves as part of a wider trust family, united by faith and values.
